We don't have anything in our 25 constitution and bylaws that says how many members a post

should have to remain. But if you would like at most of 1 2 these posts that are in your packet, these posts are 3 sitting dormant. We need to do something about it. We 4 have 65 posts in the Department with less than 15 members. 5 So what we've done is we printed those out for you. We 6 have given you a list of the names of the individuals that 7 are in those particular posts. We want you to take time 8 and give those individuals a call, find out if they want to 9 continue the post or if they would like to be transferred. 10 If it's a public member and you can't get in touch with them, send them a letter and you don't get a response back, 11 12 we will automatically transfer them. We've got to get 13 these posts off of our books if they are sitting dormant. 14 So we need your help in doing it. I think there was only one district that didn't have any. I don't remember what 15 16 district that was. If we are going to close this post, we 17 need to have this paperwork, which I also gave you a copy 18 of the post-cancellation paperwork in your packet. Zone 19 Commanders, you have posts in your zones, districts you 20 have the ones in your districts. Once you get the 21 paperwork done, we need it to the Department by the first 22 of April so it can go before the NEC in May. So we are 23 asking for your help. Also, this gives you a chance to do 24 you buddy checks. I also put information in your packets 25 about the buddy check in case you didn't know what it was

1	to give you an idea on how to do buddy check. You don't
2	want to use it as a recruiting tool, but we can also use it
3	to find out what's going on with these folks. Do we have
4	any questions?
5	MR. MILLISON: Douglas Millison, 3rd District
6	Commander. Two of the posts on my list actually went
7	through last spring to NEC.
8	ADJUTANT FINLEY-JACKSON: They are closed.

24	of the periodic membership target dates. The renewal
25	schedule also, we have already passed the October 15th, so

1	if you have members that are complaining that they just
2	sent their dues in and they are still getting a renewal
3	notification on November 13, the renewalal date is November
4	13 and they will be sending out the new renewals at that
5	time. I had a conversation with Charlie Goodin this
6	morning and some e-mails exchanged and he reminded me of
7	Article 10 of National's Constitution, Section III. There
8	is some ambiguity about when the membership year begins and
9	ends. Technically it's Janurary 1 through December 31.
10	However, in Section III, the annual dues shall be collected
11	by each Post and transmitted properly to national
12	departments or designated agents for collection and they
13	have to have them into National within 30 days. There was
14	another point that he had there, but I missed it at this
15	point. Then in the bylaws, Article 4, Section IV, a member
16	whose dues for the current year have not been paid by
17	January 1 shall be classed as delinquent. By February 1,
18	they will be suspended from all privileges in the Legion.
19	If you're still under suspension on June 30 of such year,
20	the membership in the National Legion will be forfeited.
21	So and there the dues are due in October even though it
22	is for the next membership year 2021. So you can use that
23	with your post. Any questions? Thank you, Commander.

23	allowed or able to voted in this year in 2020 be voted for
24	a one-year term in 2021 to put us back on track for two

2	back to the Finance Commission.

4	Commission is done.

6	passing of Legionnaire Musgrove, I will need a replacement
7	for Zone 3, Assistant Sergeant-at-Arms.
8	MS. NOONAN: I'll get back with you.

10	business to come before this committee? Finance
11	Commission, Terry.
12	MR. LANNING: Okay. I will just speak from
13	here. The Finance Commission meeting this morning we heard
14	from CPA Amy Watson who discussed the Department July 31,
15	2019 audit. The audit for July 31, 2019 showed a surplus
16	of \$12,312.00. We are looking at the employee health
17	insurance for renewal this fall. The same health insurance
18	plan will renewal will be an increase of 1.4 percent.
19	Items that affected this year's budget: We
20	had LIT had a drop of \$17,525.00; The Missouri Veterans
21	Commission has decreased the grant money we were to receive
22	in this year from \$240,189.00 to \$155,049.00, this is a
23	decrease of \$85,140.00, which is a 35 percent drop. Right
24	now, I don't see in the near future that is going to change
25	much. These two items has a reduction of revenue of

1 \$102,665.00. Last year we had a total reduction in expenses of \$39,406.00 caused by the Coronavirus and 2 3 cessation of activities. But this is still \$63,259.00 below the loss of \$102,665.00 in revenue. We are going to 4 look at ways to reduce cost and raise more money to try to 5 offset that difference. 6 7 One action the Finance Commission recommends 8 is that an employee hiring freeze without Finance 9 Commission approval for a new employee and that will be effective immediately if you approve my report. That's it. 10 COMMANDER WILLIAMS: All right. Thank you. 11 12 MR. LANNING: Any questions? COMMANDER WILLIAMS: Okay. You just heard the 13 14 financial report, is there a motion? SR. VICE COMMANDER GRIGSBY: Gary Grigsby, 15 Senior Vice, I move we accept the financial report. 16 17 COMMANDER WILLIAMS: Second? Any discussion? MR. BOARDMAN: Kerry Boardman, Immediate Past 18 19 Commander. So by approving the report, we are approving the hiring freeze? 20 21 MR. LANNING: Yes. By approving the report, you are approving the hiring freeze. Right now we have got 22 one spot open in Poplar Bluff. With the stipulation to 23 24 have a rehire that either Tracy or Lowry is going to have 25 to come to the Finance Commission and make a case to have a

1 hire. Otherwise, we won't have a hire temporarily. 2 MR. ADAMS: I got a guestion, Frank Adams, 3 District 14. So you're saying that there is not going to 4 be any representation or service officer for any of Southeast Missouri? That's true because that's what's 5 6 missing in Poplar Bluff. That is the employee they're 7 talking about. He was only a temporary employee -- not 8 temporary, but a part-time employee but you don't even want 9 that. 10 MR. LANNING: What we're saying is for Tracy 11 to have a hire there, she is going to have to make a case 12 to the Finance Commission to fill that position. The Commission will have to approve that or not. That's what 13 14 we are saying. MR. ADAMS: I can tell you now that's crazy 15 because we haven't had one for over a year down there. We 16 17 have to actually call and fax back and forth to St. Louis because you can't see anybody. If it's a new case, they 18 19 can't do anything with it. I have dealt with that recently 20 with a bunch of people. Now you're making it harder and it's going to stay that way. Your report, if that's 21 approved, sucks. 22 23 MR. LANNING: I'm not saying we won't fill it. 24 I'm not saying we will fill it. I'm saying the case is 25 going to have to be made for it to be filled. With us

1 looking at \$100,000.00 deficit in revenue, it's going to 2 have to be a pretty good case before the Commission will 3 approve it. 4 MR. ADAMS: You're looking at a bean county, I understand that. We're looking at helping veterans, but 5 6 you're saying you're not going to get anyone for, like, all 7 of Southeast Missouri below St. Louis. Almost going to, 8 you know, Springfield, there is nothing going to cover that 9 area. That's what you're saying because you -- I think it's crazy to put that in your report. 10 MR. LANNING: Well, for the Legion, you're 11 12 right. 13 MR. ADAMS: For the veterans, I'm correct. 14 MR. LANNING: I understand the DAV and the VFW have positions down there, and the State of Missouri has 15 16 people down there. 17 MR. ADAMS: No, the State of Missouri does not 18 because they don't answer any calls. I can give you the 19 phone number and all of their voicemail is full. The only 20 people that are working were the American Legion and they 21 have a part-time guy that volunteers at the DAV and the I go there every two weeks and you cannot get in. 22 VFW. JUDGE ADVOCATE STROM: Cassie Strom, Judge 23 24 Advocate. How long is the hiring freeze for? 25 MR. LANNING: Well, we are not sitting a date.

1	We can take it off whenever, but right now, I'm looking at
2	this to be short-term. I'm not going to set and say six
3	months or a year. I don't know when we want to take it
4	off. We are looking at other ways to try and cut cost, but
5	you know, our costs, we have a good chunk that its VA and
6	VR of our budget. Then the rest of it is through a lot of
7	other things the. Headquarter's office, we've got
8	overhead. We got all the travel cost. We have program
9	cost. We got a newsletter. It's all over the board. So
10	to try to offset that \$100,000.00 because if we don't
11	offset the \$100,000.00 then are we going to come back to
12	you all for a dues increase in two or three years? We are
13	not going to do that. When we had the dues increase, I
14	projected out as to how long it was going to last, I was
15	looking at least six to eight years for the dues increase.
16	But now you take \$100,000.00 out for each year right at the
17	beginning, that's going to have a big impact.
18	MR. ADAMS: It may be a big impact down there.
19	They had a part-time employee trained and two days later he
20	was jerked out of there after training. There is nobody
21	there. So to get a claim if you're working on one, you
22	have to call up there. They call you back. They are
23	really great about that. They can work with your existing
24	claim, but if you're a new claim, they just they are
25	having to wait until they can open up an office. That
1	

part-time employee stopped that. 1 MR. ANDERSON: Bill Anderson, District 6. 2 3 Terry, didn't last year didn't we go over all of this in 4 the budget and that was why we moved people down to part-time and reduced all of the benefits for a bunch of 5 6 the employees? 7 MR. LANNING: Yes. 8 MR. ANDERSON: Now we are back here again this 9 year saying we are not going to help veterans in a given 10 area because we got a hire freeze. That makes no sense to 11 me. Is not our purpose to help veterans? 12 MR. LANNING: I agree. When we approved the 13 budget at that time, yes, we took three full-time employees 14 to part-time. We cut some travel and we had other things that we did. 15 MR. ANDERSON: And we had a big argument over 16 17 that at that time and now you're asking for more. MR. LANNING: No, what I'm saying is since the 18 19 approval of the budget, which was May, we've had these two 20 things have happened. One we lost \$17,000.00 LIT money, 21 which our commission we get. I don't know if that's going 22 to come back. We may get a little back, but I don't know. 23 The LIT money is the insurance programs that we all go 24 into. If you have less people on the insurance program, 25 our commission is less. The other one that has really

1	taken a big hit is State grant money and we are losing
2	\$85,000.00. I don't think that's coming back and Lowry
3	doesn't think it's going to either. We have \$85,000.00 we
4	have to make up somewhere. Where are we going to do that?
5	That's a lot of money. All I'm saying is that we should
6	have a hiring freeze until we figure out exactly where we
7	are going to make the cuts and see where we are going to
8	go. I'm going to be asking Lowry, Tracy, and John
9	Buckwalter for recommendations on spending cuts and revenue
10	increases. Revenue increases is not easy to do.
11	MR. BOARDMAN: Kerry Boardman, Immediate Past
12	Department Commander, I don't want to get in to where a
13	committee starts hiring and firing people. I understand
14	this needs to go through the finance and we got this money
15	or we don't have this money. I don't want to set a
16	precedent where committees start hiring and firing. I
17	don't think it's Finance's job to hire and fire. It's
18	whoever is in charge of whoever. In that case is would be
19	Tracy, which she is working with the Finance Committe, but
20	I don't want to set the precedent where we do this. I'm
21	totally against it.

23	Commander. So if we have the hiring freeze and we approve
24	it, does that offset the \$63,000.00 or are we still going
25	to have to offset more money?

5	So what you're giving us right now is a partial solution,

2	moved on and approved if it's just informational and no
3	action required. Okay.
4	COMMANDER WILLIAMS: That's clear. Okay David
5	Voyles, Foundation.
6	MR. VOYLES: Two things I want to touch on.
7	We just had a baseball meeting last week and we was at
8	Ashland, Missouri, which was Post 152. We discussed about
9	baseball what the situation is going to be this year. Gary
10	Stone and the commissioners, we all agree, that even if
11	National this year says they're not going to have baseball,
12	we as a Commission, Baseball Commission, want to have
13	baseball because if we don't do this, we are going to be
14	losing all of these teams to other leagues. Now the DEC
15	has a final decision on these. We make a the Baseball
16	Commission will make a recommendation to the DEC to keep
17	baseball going. Now, if you choose not to, that is your
18	prerogative. If you don't, then we not have baseball
19	anymore. So we are in a catch 22. So we are trying to do
20	the best we can to keep this program going. Gary Stone has
21	been our Chairman for many years. He is also the Chairman
22	of the National Baseball Commission. So we are taking
23	everything in consideration with what is going on. If
24	anybody wants to come December 5 at Ashland, Missouri, Post
25	152 at 11:00 we will be starting another baseball meeting

1	to try to discuss some of this stuff. If you are
2	interested and you're around, you are welcome to come.
3	We've got nothing to hide. So that's one thing about
4	baseball you need to know what's going on.
5	The other thing is the foundation. We had
6	investors come down and tell us about our portfolio and how
7	we are doing. I got to put some glasses on because I can't
8	read without them. As you all know that the back in
9	March, March 3 of 2020, we had \$709,000.00. We lost on
10	January 31, we had \$830,000.00. So we, in our portfolio,
11	lost over \$100,000.00. I got better news. Now, as of
12	today, we in our portfolio, we have \$890,000.00 in the
13	foundation, which is very good. We have been good
14	averaging for all these years better than 3 percent per
15	year. Unfortunately, this issue that we have this year and
16	that we may have it next year, we are doing well. He said
17	our portfolio looks good. We also have additional sweep
18	money, which is cash money just in case we need it. We are
19	going to have probably over \$30,000.00 in sweep money. The
20	Foundation Commission decided to wait before we invest that
21	30,000.00 into our portfolio until after the election. We
22	don't, you know, I'm not saying who is going to win. We
23	want to see whoever wins, the repercussions of the stock
24	market. If there is no repercussion, that's fine.
25	Sometimes after the election, the stocks go down. If we

1	can buy into at a lower price and then later on as it gets
2	better, we will come up way ahead. So that's the situation
3	what we are doing. The portfolio and the Foundation is
4	great, believe me. We got a lot of good people in there
5	and Wells Fargo and basically is part of what we are doing.
6	They have been good for us for all of these years. I'm
7	talking about 20 or 30 years, so that's where our
8	portfolio. Okay.
9	Everyone, I put out this is our brochure.
10	The reason why this brochure is brand new is because of the
11	Legion Act. It allows people to become American Legion
12	members as of 1941. So questions about that you got to
13	understand something is that should give us more people to
14	be able to bring us back in. I'm not here to talk about
15	membership. That's not what I'm here for. This explains
16	very well if you want if want to setup a fund for one of
17	your loved ones or whatever. If you look in this here, my
18	son has got a scholarship in this and basically the reason
19	why I wanted to do that is because I wanted to keep his
20	name circulated even though a lot of people won't know him.
21	So I went to the high school and talked to their principal
22	and he basically said the same thing, that, you know, after
23	a while they wouldn't know him. So I decided to invest it
24	in the foundation and it's been very well been going. What
25	we're trying to setup and what we did on this commission

1	this week what we want to do is to reach a \$1.2 million in
2	our portfolio. If we can do this, then we as a foundation,
3	can donate the \$17,500.00, plus the \$6,800.00 you give for
4	the oratorical. So we are going to contribute \$24,000.00,
5	the Foundation, into the Department to help them meet some
6	of the cost. It has nothing to do with membership, just
7	help them whether we give them raises or equipment we need
8	or whatever. But to be able to do this, we have to reach
9	out and we are going to try to reach out to the districts.
10	We are going to try to reach out to the posts and we need
11	your help. If you understand, we have helped National and
12	they got a lot of good programs. The Legion Riders, as a
13	whole, they donate \$1 million to National when they have
14	their regular run. Dennis knows that. I know that.
15	That's the best thing that's ever happened. Okay. But we
16	need and I'm asking for help for us, our own selves, as for
17	the Department. So we need to go out there and explain why
18	we would like to reach our \$1.2 million to be able to
19	support the Foundation to be able to support all of the
20	scholarships. If we get more in there, we can possibility
21	somewhere down the road to raise the scholarship. We got
22	the \$1.2 million, that's our earmark to try to make. So I
23	have asked all our Commission to get out there and talk to
24	their district and talk to their post and that's why I gave
25	you these brochures if you find somebody who wants to have
1	

1	a portfolio for their loved ones or something, it tells you
2	how to do this and it's taxable. 501(c)(3), so they can
3	deduct this. My district last year donated \$200.00. This
4	year I twist the District Commander's arm and we are going
5	to donate \$500.00 from our district. As long as we can
6	keep our head above water, we can do that. I'm not asking
7	for a certain amount. Whatever you can give or spar,
8	that's what we need to do. We want to keep the status that
9	we are doing this for a public status, not a private
10	status. If we get to the point we can't keep a certain
11	percentage, if we go to a private status, we have to pay
12	taxes. The way it is right now, as long as we stay as a
13	public status we don't pay taxes on it. So that's why we
14	need this. Nobody on this Foundation Commission gets paid.
15	Nothing. We volunteer. If there is anything I can do or
16	help or explain, I'm willing to come down to your area, but
17	that's what we need to hear. So I hope things turn out.
18	So with that, I'm asking for your help. Commander, thank
19	you for your time.
20	COMMANDER WILLIAMS: I recommend that we
21	accept the Foundation's report coming from David Voyles.
22	Okay. Next we have American Legion Riders, Don Gerspach.
23	MR. GERSPACH: Thank you, Commander. Don
24	Gerspach, American Legion Riders Director. I would like to
25	first express my gratitude in that of the Riders and The

1 Legacy Foundation and the National Commander for our 2 participation in the American Legion Legacy Foundation 3 fundraising efforts this year. Myself, Brian Sapp, and 4 Kristen Sapp just participated in a Pony Express ride from across the country. It started in California and ended in 5 6 Indianapolis at National Headquarters where we presented a 7 check to the National Commander of \$46,000.00 from the Department and one for \$1,500.00 from Unit 21 in 8 9 Independence. We totaled \$47,500.00. This was by far the 10 largest single donation of any department on that day and probably still holds true. There was \$84 -- \$83,000.00 and 11 change and we had donated \$47,500.00 of that. So great job 12 13 to everybody. Sincere thanks to all of the posts, the 14 units, and squadron, and chapters. Please pass along our appreciation. 15

There were two changes made recently. One of 16 17 them is at the state level was the Helmet Choice Law. Not everyone may know about this, but now motorcycle riders 18 19 have a choice of whether to wear a motorcycle helmet or not 20 if they are over the age of 26, if they are riding on a regular license and not a permit, and if they are not a 21 member of the military. One of the things that we need to 22 23 impress is that this is -- what happens with that is a 24 decision that has to be made by the Post Commander who is 25 responsible for the Chapter that is a program of his post

1	and the chapter director. They need to talk about what
2	they want to do with that. What my post has done is there
3	is no restriction on the riders unless they are performing
4	a function for the post or chapter. If they are
5	representing the post, they must wear helmets. Other than
6	that, they follow state laws to wear a helmet. At
7	department level, the Legacy Fund or Legacy Ride every
8	year, and any ride that originates from a department
9	function, conference or convention, everyone will be
10	required to wear a helmet. Now, not everyone at the post
11	level may be following this law because they are not
12	necessarily interested in the helmet law. But I think it's
13	something that needs to be put out to the post commander so
14	that the ones with chapters can have a discussion with
15	their chapter and with their insurance companies.
16	So what I propose to do is I will send a copy
17	of the verbiage of this law to Lowry, the Adjutant, and
18	have her distribute that to the district commanders who can
19	further distribute that to the post commanders who are
20	riders chapters. This is the best way to get the
21	information out. I have said it to all of the department
22	chapter directors, whether that get to the post commander
23	or not, I can't guarantee. So the best way to do that is
24	to get it out to them.
25	The other thing that has recently taken place

1	is the Resolution 19 recently approved by the NEC just this
2	month. It combines the two resolutions that previously
3	govern the American Legion Rider Program nationwide. It
4	adds two requirements. One is the naming convention
5	whereas American Legion Riders in leadership positions,
6	directors and assistant directors, can only be called
7	director or assistant director. It bans and forbids the
8	verbiage of president and vice president and past president
9	and past president. Specifically because it gives the
10	impression of club formation. It doesn't belong to the
11	American Legion family norm where each different unit in
12	the family has got its own name. Commanders use and
13	presidents use by the units and chapters use directors. So
14	it standardizes everything across the board and keeps us in
15	line with not trying to present you ourselves as a club.
16	So I will include with that helmet law e-mail, I will send
17	that along to Lowry to have distributed down to the post
18	commander so they are aware of that because they are have
19	got to impress some of these things on their chapter
20	directors.
21	The other thing this stipulates, which is
22	creating a little bit of an uproar is if you are wearing
23	American Legion Rider regalia of any type, you will not
24	openly display a weapon. Now, this is not normally a
25	problem. It's not a problem in Missouri, but it is a

1	problem in some states where the general public and the
2	membership, especially the age membership, look at display
3	of weapons, open carry guns, and large knives as
4	threatening. We don't want to do that, so we are
5	forbidding that. In constitutional carry states or conceal
6	and carry states, nobody's rights are being violated. They
7	are not saying you can't carry. They are just saying you
8	can't do it when you dress like this. We have several
9	stipulations that require us to take action. Taking part
10	in electioneering or political activities while wearing
11	this is also wearing any gear, that is not a violation
12	of your rights. So those two things and I will get that to
13	Lowry.
14	The other thing is the Legacy Ride is being

15 worked on as we speak for this next year. I would like you to put the last weekend in June on your calendars. 16 17 Everyone is invited. The more the merrier. We had a pretty good turn out of our senior officer at the Legacy 18 19 Ride. It's well appreciated. We make a lot of money getting them to do things like putting on a tutu for you. 20 21 So the more senior level leadership we can get involved --22 and you can drive your car or ride on the back of 23 somebody's motorcycle. One day, a part of the day, the 24 whole three days; anything you can do to come out is 25 greatly appreciated and welcomed. Thank you, Commander.

1	COMMANDER WILLIAMS: Thank you. Is there
2	further business?
3	ADJUTANT FINLEY-JACKSON: So in your packet
4	you have a press release, which I would like you to turn
5	your attention to. It's for the Missouri National Guard
6	Hall of Fame. The Missouri National Guard is starting a
7	Hall of Fame, so if you know any Missouri National Guard,
8	men or women, who you think are eligible for this program,
9	please contact me. I will give you more information. I
10	didn't bring enough of them to pass around and I apologize
11	for that. I just stuck them in the District Commander's
12	packet. Their office will be located in Kirksville and
13	they are also looking for some members to serve on their
14	board. If you are interested in serving on the Board of
15	the Missouri National Guard Hall of Fame, please give me a
16	call and let me know. They don't have any real criteria.
17	I just got this a couple of days ago.
18	The other thing is National will be holding
19	what's called Training Tuesday. If you currently use
20	"mylegion.org" for your post, you want to get onto this
21	training on Tuesday. We are trying to get the link put up
22	on to our website so that you won't have to, you know,
23	because it's down here on it's not on the paper, get the
24	link on our website. They are new. They are going from
25	"mylegion" to a new program, transfer. Apparently, it's

1	going to take a little bit of work. It's supposed to start
2	at the end of November, but they want to start getting us
3	trained on it now. So if you use "mylegion" for your post,
4	in any capacity, you need to be on this training on
5	Tuesday. It's at 6:00 our time, 7:00 Indianapolis time.
6	Again, we going to try to get the link on the website. If
7	not, just e-mail me and I'll send you a link, but you need
8	to be on this training because that will alleviate you
9	calling up to the Department and asking 1,000 questions.
10	It's new to us also. We'll be on the training, so we'll
11	all learn together. You got time to be on that training,
12	that's at 6:00 on Tuesday and you use "mylegion", please be
13	on there. If you currently use aim, some posts know what
14	I'm taking about, it is going away effective the end of
15	December. So you will only be able to process on this new
16	program. Please be on the training if you can on Tuesday.
17	Any questions?
18	JUDGE ADVOCATE STROM: I also sent around on
19	the tables, a press release but this is not for the
20	National Guard Hall of Fame. It's on Missouri Veterans
21	Hall of Fame. This organization was actually brought into
22	being at our annual convention in 2019. A group of folks
23	got together during that time. Our first four inductees
24	are going to be inducted and we are going to have the
25	ceremony this coming Friday at Capitol building in the

1	rotunda at 2:00 p.m. What's cool is that two of the
2	inductees of the first class of the Hall of Fame are
3	American Legion members. One is Joe Frank, who is going to
4	be attending in person. The second one Oppie Owens out of
5	the St. Louis Service Women Post 404. So anybody is
6	welcome. You have to wear facemask. We have to follow the
7	rule of the Capitol building in terms of social distancing
8	and all of that. It shouldn't be real long, but it should
9	be a nice ceremony. Questions?
10	COMMANDER WILLIAMS: Good of the Order?
11	MR. VOYLES: I would like to meet with the
12	members of education and scholarship committee who are here
13	after this meeting adjourns.
14	COMMANDER WILLIAMS: Anyone else? Okay.
15	Mileage approval, do we have a motion?

17	moved.
